All About Moles



What Do They Look Like?

Moles are small, round animals with large, spade-like paws. They have small eyes and a little, pink nose. You cannot see their ears very well. Moles are about 15cm long and weigh about 130g, which is about the same weight as a bar of soap.

Did you know...?

Moles are mammals, which means they don't lay eggs, they give birth to live young. Baby moles are called pups and they have no hair when they are born.



Moles are covered in black, soft fur

What Do They Eat?

Moles love to eat earthworms! In fact, they are known to eat nearly their own body weight in earthworms – in one day. They also eat underground insects. This helps get rid of insects which might damage the roots of plants.

Did you know...?

Many people think moles are blind but they aren't. They don't see very well though and rely on feeling vibrations from their prey or sniffing out the earthworms and insects.




Where Do They Live?

Moles live underground. They dig long tunnels that link together. They build chambers at the end of some of their tunnels. These are used for storing food, looking after their babies and sleeping.

Moles can be found in grassland areas and at the edge of woodland. They live on their own.

Moles are thought to help with the drainage in soil by digging their tunnels. This also makes the soil better for plants to grow.



What Do They Do?

Moles dig their tunnels and eat earthworms. You might sometimes see mounds of earth on top of some fields and long gardens; this shows that a mole has been digging under the ground and thrown the piles of dirt up, out of their way.

They use their large, front paws in a way you might use your arms and hands when you are swimming. They push the earth out of the way in front of them.

Did you know...?

Moles can dig up to 20 metres of tunnel in a day!
